





Her work has appeared in *In Posse Review*, *California Quarterly*, *Penumbra*, *Quercus Review*, and *Song of the San Joaquin*. She is co-editor of the anthology *More Than Soil*, *More Than Sky* (Quercus Review Press, 2011), and a fellow of the Squaw Valley Community of Writers. Lee Herrick writes that "Beratlis is a fierce talent whose beautiful mind encompasses the land, the open road, the kitchen window, and the heart's inconstancies. Her first full-length collection is one of the best debuts I have read."



Helen Wickes lives in Oakland. Her four books of poetry are *In Search of Landscape* (Sixteen Rivers Press, 2007), *Moon Over Zabriskie* and *Dowser's Apprentice* (both from Glass Lyre Press, 2014), and her most recent collection *World As You Left It*, published this year by Sixteen Rivers Press.
